#### Entry 1

Entry 1	Date/Week SOW Ref:	Notes/materials:
Simple present tense - (to) be:		
My name is Salma. I am Polish. We are students.		
Simple present tense - common regular verbs:		
I play football. She goes to college. We eat chicken. I don't drink wine		
Have got:		
l've got one sister. She's got two children. l've got a sore throat. He's got a headache.		
Present continuous of common regular verbs:		
I'm watching TV. She's studying English. We're not waiting for Ali.		
There is/are + noun (+ prepositional phrase):		
There is a television (on the wall.) There isn't a chair. There are some books (on the table.) There aren't any curtains.		



#### Entry 2

Simple present tense with frequency adverbs and phrases:		
I listen to music every day. She always goes to church on Sunday. He sometimes gets up late at the weekend. They never eat meat. Saara drinks coffee every morning		
Simple past tense of regular and common irregular verbs with time markers such as ago:		
I went to the doctors yesterday. She didn't visit Finland last year. Mubarak didn't come to college on Monday. They moved to the UK three years ago.		
Questions: When did they go? How did she travel? Did they fly from London?		



Future time/arrangements using present continuous +use of time markers:	
I'm travelling to Australia next year. She's playing cricket at the weekend. Are you going shopping on Saturday? What are you doing tonight? Is Ruth coming to the party next month/in December?	
Word order in compound sentences: Use of and + but + or:	
She doesn't like swimming, but she loves tennis. I drink coffee but I don't like tea. I visited Manchester and I saw the stadium. They missed the train and didn't eat any lunch. I'm travelling by car or by train.	
Likes & dislikes with a limited range of 'verb + ing' & gerunds:	
I don't like playing football. I really like learning English. Jack enjoys listening to music. She loves camping. He hates smoking. We don't mind flying. They like dancing.	
Common verbs + infinitive:	
We decided to leave early. Anita wanted to go home. I forgot to tell the teacher. She didn't like to travel by bus.

Past continuous & (past cont. v. past.simple + when/and/ so)		
What were you doing yesterday afternoon? I was studying. We were watching a film. He was working on his computer at 6pm.		
I was listening to the radio, so I didn't hear the doorbell ring. I was walking home last night and I saw my friend. She was cooking dinner when she cut her finger.		
Present perfect:		
I have visited London three times. She's eaten all the chocolate. I've lost my wallet!		
Have you been to America. No, I haven't. Has John gone out? Yes, he has.

Present perfect continuous:		
I've been gardening. What've you been doing? He's been reading a book all day. You look tired! Yes, I've been playing badminton. Have you been working all morning? Has it been raining?		
Past perfect(+ after/before):		
The had left the restaurant when John arrived. They left before I'd spoken to them. We'd finished all the work before the end of the day. I hadn't been to Lancaster until I started working there.		
Present and past simple passive:		
The flowers are watered by the gardener. The coffee beans are ground by a machine. The food was made by a brilliant chef. I was given this book by Jack.

Use of a <u>wider &amp; more combined range of</u> simple, continuous, perfect and perfect continuous verb forms, active and passive: as outlined in L1 & L2 grammar summary		
Future in the past & future perfect/continuous:		
I was going to tell them, but I didn't get the chance. She will have finished this novel by morning. Next year you will have been working here for five years.		
Would expressing habit in the past:		
Every Saturday I would go on a long bike ride. My dad would read me amazing stories every night at bedtime. We'd visit Auntie Clara every summer.
