## Using Capital Letters

Capital Letters are used:

- at the beginning of a sentence
- for the first singular person (I):

When I heard the news, I was happy.

- for the first letter of - names of people:
Fred Bloggs, Lucy Smith
- names of roads, towns, cities:

Oxford Street, Dale Avenue, Stockport

- name of countries, continents:

Spain, Asia, Australia, Finland

- the title of a person:

Mr/Mrs/Miss/Ms/Lord/Sir

- the title of a book, film, CD:

The Twits, Jaws, Take That

- days of the week, months of the year:

Wednesday, June

- abbreviations (they're often titles):

BBC, USB, CD
